who oversaw the persecution and extermination of all lews and other non-Arvans, and those opposed to the regime. The death of his parents and

outright rejection from art schools in Vienna forced him into underpaid work as a laborer. During the First World War, Hitler served in the infantry and was decorated for bravery. After the war, he became actively involved with socialist political groups and quickly rose to power, establishing himself as Chairman of the National Socialist German Worker's party. In 1924,

Hitler led a coalition of nationalist groups in a bid to overthrow the **Bavarian** government in Munich. The infamous Munich "Beerhall putsch" was unsuccessful, and Hitler was arrested. During the nine months he was in prison, an embittered and frustrated Hitler dictated a personal manifesto to his loval follower Rudolph Hess. He vented his sentiments against communism

and the Jewish people in this document. which was to become Mein Kampf, the controversial book that is seen as the blue-print for Hitler's political and military campaign. In Mein Kampf, Hitler describes his strategy for rebuilding Germany and conquering Europe. It is a glimpse into the mind of a man who destabilized world peace and pursued the genocide now known as the Holocaust. Murder on the
